As custodian of 18,454 hectares of land across England and Wales, the Duchy is in the unique position of being able to take a long-term approach and is committed to

## Duke of Lancaster attends Maundy service at Blackburn Cathedral

The Queen made her first ever visit to Blackburn Cathedral in April to hand out Maundy money to 176 pensioners in recognition of their service to the local community and the church.

Accompanied by His Royal Highness, the Duke of Edinburgh, Her Majesty was greeted at Blackburn railway station by Lord Shuttleworth, the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire and Chairman of the Council of the Duchy of Lancaster, before being driven down Church Street to the Cathedral for the service.

The 176 pensioners, consisting of 88 men and 88 women – the figure reflecting Her Majesty's age – were each presented with a red purse of money and a white purse of silver Maundy coins.

This year the red purse contained a £5 coin commemorating the 300th anniversary

of Queen Anne's reign and a 50p coin commemorating the 20th Commonwealth Games in Glasgow this summer.

Historically, the red purse contains a modest allowance for clothing, provisions and the redemption of the Sovereign's gown, while the white purse contains uniquely minted Maundy money.

Members of the royal family have taken part in Maundy ceremonies since the 13th Century, handing out money and gifts to celebrate the Last Supper and recall Christ's simple act of humility, by washing the feet of His disciples. However, Maundy money as we know it today was first handed out during the reign of Charles II in 1662.

After the ceremony Her Majesty spent time with religious and civic dignitaries at Ewood Park, the home of Blackburn Rovers Football Club, before attending a civic lunch.

## High speed internet connection at Crewe Hall Farm Buildings

Set within self-contained, landscaped grounds, the historic development was originally built over 120 years ago as a model farm to serve nearby Crewe Hall.

# The Duchy of Lancaster appoints first ever female Constable of Lancaster Castle

Lancaster Castle has a female Constable for the first time since records began.

Former headteacher of Lancaster Girls Grammar School, Mrs Pam Barker, has been appointed as the new Constable of Lancaster Castle by Her Majesty the Queen as Duke of Lancaster.

The Constable of Lancaster Castle is an ancient appointment dating back to the 13th Century and Mrs Barker, who succeeds Mr Gordon Johnson is, as far as can be ascertained, the first woman to hold the position.

The Constable is required to formally offer the keys of the castle to Her Majesty on the occasion of a royal visit.

Mr Johnson's last significant function as Constable was to officiate at the opening of the gates of the castle to the public in spring 2013, following the departure of HM Prison Service.

The Constable is appointed by Her Majesty as Duke of Lancaster for a term of five years and may be reappointed once for a further term of five years.

Mrs Barker said: "I am looking forward to getting out into the community, including working with schools around the district to let them know about the castle, its history and its exciting future."

Lancaster Castle is open daily with guided tours and special events held throughout the year.

## Strong first year for Root Farm

## Duchy unveils Harrogate apartments

Apartments at the Duchy's new residential development in Harrogate have been placed on the market to let.

The Duchy of Lancaster has invested £2million in a sustainable development at 11 Ripon Road, which comprises 13 one and two bedroom apartments in two buildings.

Granville House is a Victorian building which has been converted from its former use as offices, while Villiers House is a three-storey new build complex.

Prospective tenants are now able to register their interest with letting agents Linley & Simpson, with the apartments available to let from September.

Each apartment will be finished to a very high standard and tenants will also benefit from landscaped communal areas and allocated parking spaces.

Both buildings have strong green credentials, with high performance double glazing, high efficiency and low emission boilers, and LED lighting.

The buildings have been named in honour of 19th century Duchy Chancellors, Sir Granville George Leveson-Gower and George Villiers, who strongly championed the growth of Harrogate as an upmarket spa town.

## Beekeeping grant launched

The Duchy of Lancaster has launched a new Beekeeping Grant to encourage its farm tenants to support the country's rapidly declining bee population.

The Duchy is offering start-up support for tenants or interested parties who wish to take up beekeeping on its land. The grant will provide aid for the equipment required to begin keeping bees as well as to cover the cost of training courses delivered by the network of local beekeeping associations and the British Beekeeping Association.

In recent years the number of beekeepers in the UK has declined and bees are reducing in number. Bees are very important to the agriculture industry and the wider environment.

Nathan Thompson, chief executive of the Duchy of Lancaster, said: "As custodian of the land with significant interest in the long-term viability of the countryside, we are seeking means to help promote bees and beekeeping within our Surveys."

## Supporting farming families

The Duchy continues to support farming families, with the re-letting of Hodder Bank Farm in Whitewell.

Several very good proposals were received following a closed tender exercise, undertaken by managing agent Smiths Gore, with existing farm tenants on the Whitewell Estate being invited to tender for the holding.

After careful consideration, the successful applicants were the Coar family, who also hold the tenancy of 190-acre Higher Lees Farm.

Frank and Ruth Coar and their sons Stephen and Richard will use Hodder Bank Farm for additional capacity, particularly for dairy followers and replacements coming into the main herd at Higher Lees.

Hodder Bank Farm, which had previously been run as a dairy holding, comprises of 323 acres of grassland with a farmhouse and a good range of buildings. Stephen Coar and his fiancé will live at Hodder Bank when the current house refurbishment is complete.

"As one of the main hindrances for aspiring beekeepers is the associated start-up cost, we are proposing to offer a grant to cover the initial cost should any of the Duchy's tenants wish to keep bees. The Beekeeping Grant will cover a beginners course officiated by a beekeeping association, essential equipment including a hive, safety wear and honey extractor, as well as the first swarm of bees which will be used to begin honey production."

This year's Beekeeping Grant has been oversubscribed and funds are now allocated for the first wave of interested parties.

The awards have been set up as part of our commitment to the future of the farming industry. The Duchy of Lancaster is committed to protecting the viability of our agricultural land holdings and one of the key ways we can do this is by supporting the next generation of farmers.

In addition to the bursary scheme, the Duchy of Lancaster Benevolent Fund will continue to provide annual grants to Myerscough College, to be distributed to students, as a reflection of their academic achievements, who are in need of additional financial support. The Duchy of Lancaster will also continue to sponsor two attendees at the Oxford Farming Conference every year.


the guests and making sure they have a fantastic holiday.
